Living the Holy Rule We've Professed:

Our Promise: At each of our Professions, we made a *permanent* commitment before God, our fraternity, and the other members of the People of God that in our secular state, we promise to live all the days of our lives the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ in the Secular Franciscan Order by observing its rule of life.

The Rule: Our current rule was approved and confirmed by Pope Paul VI in 1978. It is the fourth expression of the Rule since the first Rule in 1221. After Vatican II in the 1960's, it became obvious that the Rule given by Pope Leo XIII in the 1880's needed to be changed. Thus, we have our current Rule of 1978 (also referred to as the "Pauline" Rule).

Suggestions:

- 1. Read, understand, digest and incarnate the Rule.
- 2. Realize that living according to our Rule requires a dedicated spirit it takes effort and requires perseverance.
- 3. In addition to reviewing one article of our Rule each day, consider reading a corresponding article in our Constitutions. The articles of the Constitutions interpret and explain our Rule in further detail and enable us to live out our gospel lives.

WELCOME THE STRANGER

This is a new ministry that was selected for Outreach in 2025. Welcome the Stranger works in tandem with Exodus to provide the necessities that a family would need when moving into an apartment for the first time. We will be helping to provide these necessities in the months of **April** and **October**.

Welcome the Stranger conducts gatherings of these items through specific collection times at Holy Family Parish. The complete collection includes items for the kitchen, bathroom, bedrooms and cleaning supplies. The Council has signed up our fraternity to provide the items needed for the Bath. The necessary items are listed below. A sign-up sheet will be available at the March and September gatherings. Items selected will be brought to the fraternity gatherings in April and October.

Pope Francis – Seek Christ in Abandoned Tabernacles of the Poor, the Lonely

Jesus asks all Christians to prepare a place for him, not in "exclusive, selective places" but rather in uncomfortable places that are "untouched by love, untouched by hope," Pope Francis said. "How many persons lack dignified housing or food to eat! All of us know people who are lonely, troubled and in need: they are abandoned tabernacles. We, who receive from Jesus our own room and board, are here to prepare a place and a meal for these, our brothers and sisters in need."

In a reflection on the Gospel reading in which Jesus instructs his disciples to find a place to celebrate the Passover, the pope said that although the disciples were supposed to prepare a place, they discover a large room that is furnished and ready. "Jesus prepares for us and asks us to be prepared," the pope said. "What does he prepare for us? A place and a meal. A place much more worthy than the large furnished room of the Gospel. The church, where there is, and must be, room for everyone....The bread of heaven is the only matter on earth that tastes of eternity."

The Pope said that Christians live "eucharistically" when they give themselves in service to others, imitating Jesus who "became bread broken for our sake." Christians are called to prepare for Jesus' coming, "not by keeping our distance but by entering our cities" and tearing down "the walls of indifference and silent collusion."

"The Eucharist invites us to let ourselves by carried along by the wave of Jesus, to not remain grounded on the beach in the hope that something may come along, but to cast into the deep, free, courageous and united."
